Both struggled with confidence as to whether they will be able to achieve success in the arts. Now though, these two former Institute of Technical Education (ITE) students have proven the opposite. One of them is a music director for a national concert, while the other is an actor in a highly anticipated English theatre production. More on the success story of this duo who have just graduated with honours degrees from LASALLE College of the Arts.

Playing to the tune of his own success

Never give up on your journey in the arts, no matter the trials and tribulations encountered.

That message by his father will forever be etched in the mind of ITE graduate, Mr Danial Ariffin Azman. At that time, his father was working as an operations executive in Doha, Qatar, and had to return to Singapore after a stroke.

Danial, 28 years old, saw ITE's events management programme as a doorway for him into the world of the arts. The positive and cheery young man has since obtained a Diploma in Sonic Arts from Republic Polytechnic, and a BA(Hons) Music degree, with a specialism in Composition, from LASALLE College of the Arts.

His first opportunity came swiftly following graduation, when he was entrusted to arrange and direct music for national concert *Soulful Silver Screen Melodies* at the School of the Arts Singapore this Saturday. It was commissioned by the National Arts Council as part of Silver Arts 2019 – a festival dedicated to celebrating seniors and creative ageing in the arts.

A young man with an 'old' soul, Danial is also thrilled to be arranging the song *Keluhan* for a tribute dedicated to singer-actress Saloma at the Malay Heritage Centre.

"Some ITE graduates struggle with a sense of inferiority that they will never be good enough to be given positions of trust when on the hunt for a job," he shared.

"My advice to them is to maintain a positive mindset and to leverage on their strengths in the fields that they love. Your time at ITE can be an opportunity for self-empowerment."

Danial, who is a member of the Orkestra Melayu Singapura (OMS), is grateful for the opportunity to direct the music at *Soulful Silver Screen Melodies*. He is especially thankful for the faith placed in him by the concert's band of 10 musicians.

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"I had to internalise classic Malay film songs from the 50s and 60s and quite frankly, I have never heard most of them before, like *Rintihan Kamaruzzaman*.

"However, when I did the rearrangement, I realised that these songs were evergreen and their melodies can be remembered even after a long time. The lyrics are lovely and the singers have also given the songs a golden touch," he added.

Other work lined-up for Danial include arranging music for The Marsiling Chinese Orchestra, who is set to present a medley of songs from the Bee Gees and the iconic dance movie *Grease* (1978), at the Botanic Gardens this weekend. He looks forward to the challenge of rearranging English melodies to suit the accompaniment of traditional Chinese instruments.

"In the past, I felt that my dream of becoming an orchestra leader like Ahmad Ja'afar was beyond me, and that my music studies was just something to finish as quickly as possible. Now though, after having obtained a first-class honours, I think I quite enjoy learning more about music, and can imagine myself getting a Master's Degree next," he said, ending on a positive note.

Emerging out of his cocoon with the arts

His high-pitched voice led to him to be ostracised and he consequently kept to himself. His family also could not quite grasp why he was so adamant at making a livelihood out of singing and dancing.

Such was the situation Mr Muhammad Shafiq Haziq Suderman was in, just several years ago, when he was still studying logistics at an ITE. Taking it as part and parcel of his growth, he has since moved on from these experiences.

At LASALLE's 33rd Convocation, Shafiq graduated with honours from the Musical Theatre programme. This is his second time attending a convocation ceremony, with the first being at the Diploma level when he majored in Performance.

The adept triple threat, who can act, sing and dance his way on stage, was talent-spotted even before graduation by Pangdemonium – a local theatre group with the mission to present productions which are challenging, inspiring and relevant to society without compromising on artistic value. He is set to star in their upcoming production, *Urinetown*.

When he was interviewed recently at LASALLE, Shafiq said: "I can still remember that moment when I fell in love with the arts. It was when I joined

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the musical *ITE Show Choir* and met many other talented youths who were equally in search of opportunities to showcase their talent without being disparaged or stereotyped.

"In my heart, I was looking for something that could give me confidence and strength after my experience with being bullied.

"Initially rehearsals were tough without my family's blessing. They could not understand what a journey in the arts was like. But once they saw my performance and felt my passion, they have been my strongest supporters since."

Shafiq has learnt a lot about self-improvement, to set aside his ego, act professionally and to accept rejection when auditions fall through.

"Preparing for *Urinetown* has been amazing. I've met with seasoned theater practitioners such as Adrian Pang, his wife Tracie Pang, and renowned Malaysian artist Sean Ghazi, who was very well-mannered and willing to share about his experiences. This made me realised that the arts can affect us even in a casual setting when one is just chatting," he shared.
